The day following the meeting, the club organized two highly interesting tours of Paul Hampson's and Rose and Mac Jakeman's farms. Before beginning the tours, we took a moment to support the regional 4-H team in their fundraising event at Jakeman's Maple Farm. **Greg Mount** (Ayrvale) was generous in picking up the breakfast bill, but the responsibility for working off all those waffles and maple syrup is all mine!

We began our tour at Boon Crocket farm, where we visited their brand-new facilities which include a single-sided milking parlour, free stalls on deep bedding, and natural ventilation. The favourable winter climate of the Southern Ontario region allows the herds to spend time outdoors throughout most of the year.

The second visit took place at Paul Hampson's farm, Actifact Haven, where we also discovered newly constructed buildings. After several weeks of delays in the construction projects, most of the herd is now kept in free stalls. The former tie-stall barn is still used for milking, and cows remain there at night. The Hampson team can now expect better and easier work days ahead.

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
